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General information

Foreword

Level of living surveys have been conducted and used in the production of social statistics as well as in welfare research since the late 1960s. In most surveys, however, the oldest old have not been included.

In Sweden, the first level of living survey was conducted in 1968. On a panel data basis the survey has then been continued with interview waves in 1974, 1981 and 1991. The responsibility for this survey has been assigned to the Swedish Institute for Social Research at Stockholm University. On all occasions, however, the upper age limit has been the same as in the original survey, i.e., 75 years. Regardless of the original reasons for this restriction in age groups, it has meant that an important, and growing, part of the population has been left outside the scope of welfare research.

SWEOLD, the Swedish Panel Study of Living Conditions of the Oldest Old, is basically a longitudinal follow-up survey based on the nationally representative first level of living survey of 1968. The purpose of the 1992 study was to follow up persons who had participated in earlier surveys in order to create a longitudinal data set including the oldest old. Thereby, it will be possible to relate the situation in 1992 for persons aged 77 and older to their living conditions in 1968.

The sample presented in this code book consists of those persons born between 15 February 1892 and 15 February 1915 who had been interviewed previously at least once in any of the level of living surveys 1968, 1972 or 1981. Of these 1 936 persons, 563 were still alive in January 1992. This provides a nationally representative sample of persons aged 77 to 98 years. We were able to locate all but two of the subjects, and we managed to obtain an extremely high response rate, 95.4 percentage.

For a more thorough description of the planning of the fieldwork and the experiences achieved as well as different kinds of measurement considerations see Lundberg, O., & Thorslund, M: Fieldwork and measurement considerations in surveys of the oldest old. The purpose of this 1992 SWEOLD code book is to document our data files so that they will be as useful as possible for research purposes. Simple frequencies are given for each item in the questionnaire and for centrally created variables. This means that for more simple analyses the results given in the code book could be sufficient. The code book also makes it possible for the researcher to control the results obtained. The design of the code book largely follows the design used

in the production of code books for the level of living surveys 1968, 1974, 1981 and 1991.

In the data files the variables are in the same order as in the code book. STATA system file, SPSS (export file or system file), and SAS system file (V 603) are the standard formats.

The code book has been compiled by Ingemar Kåreholt and Ingrid Tinglöf. Ingemar Kåreholt has been responsible for the contents of the code book as well as other work necessary with the data set. He has organized the data, made the necessary recodings and corrections and made decisions about codes for the different types of non-responses. He has also decided which variables to include in the data set and has constructed new variables.

Ingrid Tinglöf has been invaluable for her careful and efficient work in transforming the data into readable tables and for the layout.

The data collection was supported by grants from the Swedish Council for Social Research (No 91-0150), the Medical Research Council (No B92-27Å-09997-01) and the Swedish Council for Planning and Co-ordination of Research (No 910245:6 A14-5/86). The Swedish Council for Planning and Co-ordination of Research has granted the means for further data collections such as mortality data and data from various registers, as well as documentation of the variables included in this code book (930422 A19-5/4 and 950596:2 A19-5/17).




